

Picton St Action Centre Sustainable Travel Leaflet



Rail

There is a local station (Montpelier) 5 minutes walk from Picton St. You can catch local trains from Clifton; Redland; Stapleton Rd; Laurence Hill. You can also connect to Bristol Temple Meads, the central train station.

If you are travelling from outside of Bristol, you could also catch a connecting bus from Bristol Temple Meads to Stokes Croft—the **U1**.

10 - 12 Picton St is very well located to enable sustainable means of transport to visit the centre. A stones throw from a local train station; many main bus routes & walkable from the city centre, this leaflet should help you find a way to reduce your carbon footprint when travelling to the building!

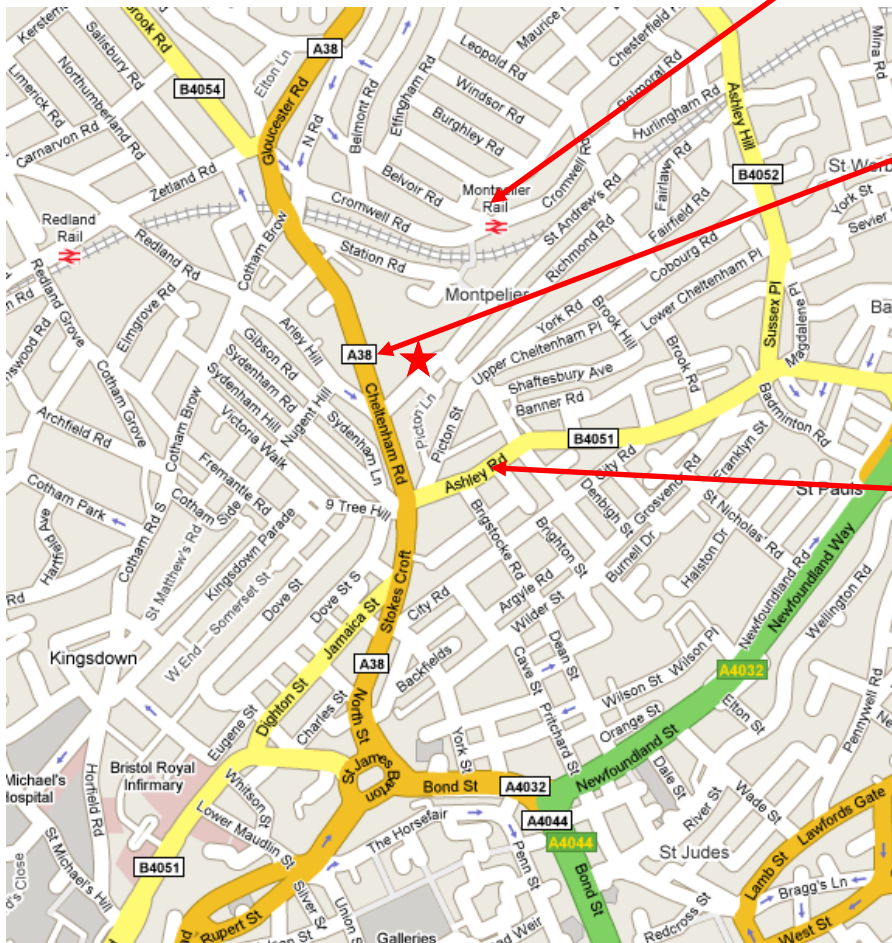

Cycles

Bristol benefits from an array of cycle paths, not least the Bristol to Bath cycle path which ends about 1 mile from Picton St.

The centre also has a shower for cyclists to use; 8 secure cycle spaces within the garden and will soon have further racks located to the rear of the building.

Buses

Buses that travel along the **Cheltenham Rd/Stokes Croft** include:

- No. 70 (Staple Hill—City Centre)
- No. 71 (Bradley Stoke—Centre)
- No. 72 (Olveston—Centre)
- No. 73 (Cribbs Causeway—Centre);
- No. 74 (Bakers Ground—Centre)
- No. 75 (Cribbs Causeway—Hartcliffe & Whitchurch Lane)
- No. 76 (Southmead—Hartcliffe)
- No. 309 (Thornbury & Dursley—Bristol)
- No. U1 (Bower Ashton/Centre—Frenchay)

Buses that travel along **Ashley Road** include

- No. 5 (Staple Hill—Centre)
- No. 25 (Ashton Vale—Lockleaze)



Walking

Bristol City Centre is only 10 minutes walk from Picton St. From Broadmead, one of the main shopping districts, you head under the St James Barton underpass and down Stokes Croft, turning into Ashley Road (from where you can see Picton St).
